GERALD KIRN

At present retired from a busy life of selling insurance, Mr. Kirn is greeted daily on the streets of Council Bluffs by his former students. His main contribution—besides firm and forward leadership—was the bringing of culture and the love of the arts to A.L. His philosophy is that each person in this country is born with certain qualifications which education refines into an upstanding life. As he says, "Education is the best investment a young person can make."

JOHN STEINBAUGH

A graduate of Abraham Lincoln High School, Mr. Steinbaugh is now Professor of Philosophy at Aroostock State College of Maine. He came to A.L. from Columbia University with the most advanced ideas of education. He believed that students should progress at their own speed and he introduced core curriculum. Young people were his life and he majored in stimulating their thinking. He will be remembered as A.L.'s youngest principal with "freedom" ideas of education.

Currently an Investment Consultant, Mr. Stuelke served as Assistant Principal to Mr. Steinbaugh, thus being promoted to the principalship when Mr. Steinbaugh resigned. He introduced many new courses at A.L. and began the Adult Education program in the city. Also, his cumulative record folder was adopted by the school system. His philosophy for the Class of 1970 is this: "You are graduating from the greatest high school in the world in the greatest country in the world and are the best prepared class to meet the future."

For nine years, Mr. Owen directed activities at A.L. He came from northern Iowa and has since returned to McGregor, Iowa, where he is now principal of the high school. His outstanding contribution while at A.L. was computerized scheduling. He has fond memories of working with dedicated teachers, a loyal student body, and fine townspeople. His philosophy for the Centennial Class is "God, First—Others, Second—Myself, Last."

When Abraham Lincoln High School moved to 1205 Bonham Avenue, it acquired a new principal, Mr. Kenneth Kuester, who came from Benson High in Omaha. Mr. Kuester's special goal is to develop a curriculum which most nearly meets the needs of all the students. His three years of memories include his first day at the new A.L., a student sit-down in the gym, a certain senior banquet, a year's struggle with an eight-period day, the senior lounge, short hair or long hair, and legalized culottes. "You can make something of yourself of which your family and school can be justly proud," is his philosophy to the Class of 1970.

REBUILDING

Most people in Council Bluffs think of two high schools when Abraham Lincoln is mentioned: A.L. on Bluff Street and A.L. on Bennett Avenue.

That isn't all!

Most folks do not know that the first high school in Council Bluffs was organized in 1868. It was located on Pierce Street between Franklin and Union. In 1868, high school students

went to school in the old Washington School located on Scott

Street. During that time a high school was built on the present-day Kirn Field. As the years rolled on and the enrollment grew, high school classes were moved to Bloomer School. In 1880, another change took the students to the new Washington Avenue building.

Another transfer was made to the school on Bluff Street in 1900. In 1913, a twelve-room annex was built so as to accommodate eight-hundred students in the school.

In 1923, the Council Bluffs High School on Bluff Street was renamed Abraham Lincoln. A gymnasium, which housed band rooms also, was completed in 1926.

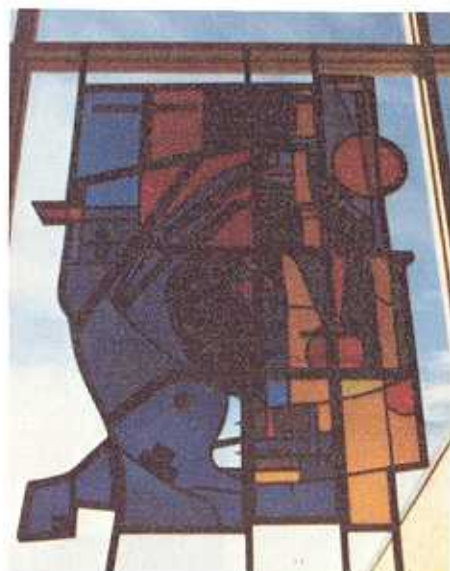
Due to the continued growth of Council Bluffs a new high school building was approved by the citizens and the first phase was opened in 1961.

Many of the Class of '70 have gone six years straight beginning with the seventh grade. When the new A.L. was opened as a senior high school the old A.L. was renamed Kirn Junior High after G. W. Kirn, a long-time principal of the old Abraham Lincoln. Students who have gone to the school would never know it today with its white halls and the auditorium as the library.

This metamorphosis has proven that the past century has been one of rebuilding.

GRADUATION

Graduating classes at Abraham Lincoln have grown from four in the Class of 1870, to four hundred and thirty-five in the Class of 1970.

Townpeople will remember that for years girl graduates wore long white dresses and carried a dozen red roses; the boys wore dark suits.

Graduation was held in the City Auditorium and scores of people stood on the Washington School playground to see the seniors march across the street to the exercises.

The auditorium continually filled to capacity, and special extensions had to be built on to the stage to accommodate the growing classes.

In later years, ceremonies were held on Kirn Field—if weather permitted!

Mr. Theron Stuelke upset many seniors by requiring caps and gowns at graduation ceremonies. The transition was decisive.

Now, girls wear white caps and gowns, and the boys wear blue.

RESOURCES

Abraham Lincoln High School has seen a continual change in the resources from which the students and the teachers alike draw to get the best education possible. From the basic "readin', 'ritin', and 'rithmetic," the curriculum has been expanded to include such "now" subjects as psychology, calculus and drivers' education. Courses now emphasize study in depth of basic concepts rather than relying primarily on memorization. Little did the schoolmasters of a century ago dream that their standard slates and chalk would later be supplemented with overhead projectors, electric typewriters, and a host of audio-visual aids. Learning, besides becoming much more extensive, has become interesting and "tuned in" to the current times. Through the evolution of a challenging curriculum, combined with advanced methods of presenting the subject matter, education at Abraham Lincoln has been enlivened during the last century. Although the result—knowledge—may be the same, the resources used to achieve this result have been updated to keep pace with the times.



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ENTERTAINMENT

School functions have contributed to the "whirl of entertainment" in Council Bluffs for the last century. Movies, T.V. and cars have taken their toll of gate receipts, but parents and students are still attracted to school plays, road shows, operettas, and concerts. Maypole dances and gym pageants have died out (for which girls were most thankful) but the spring prom and its king and queen were a glamorous replacement.

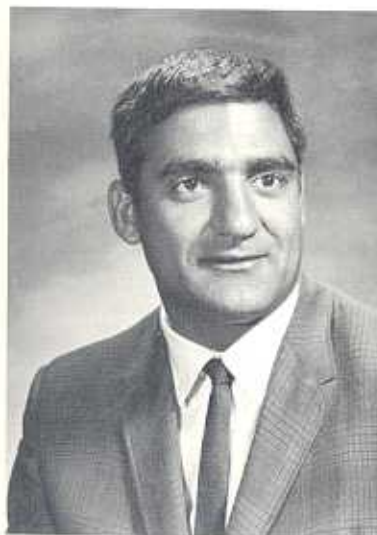

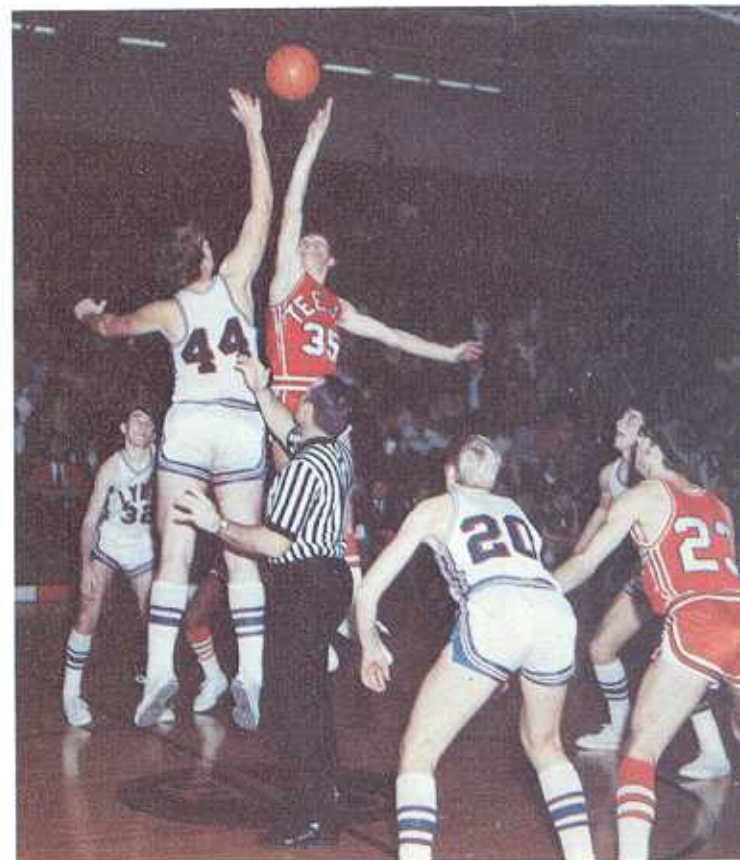
SPORTS

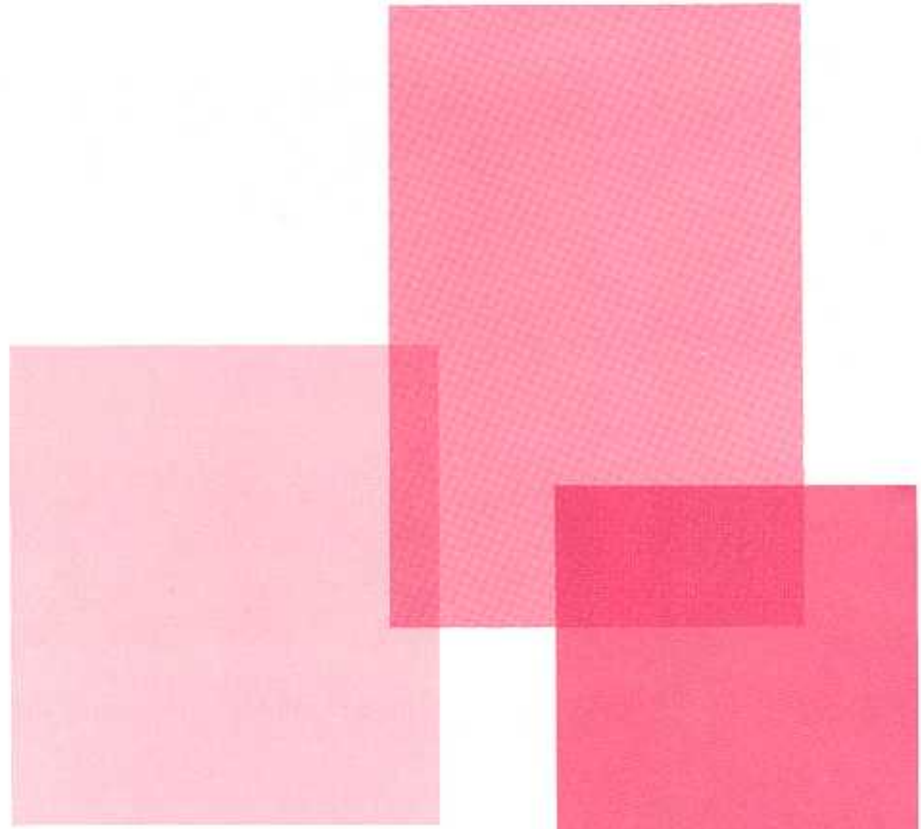

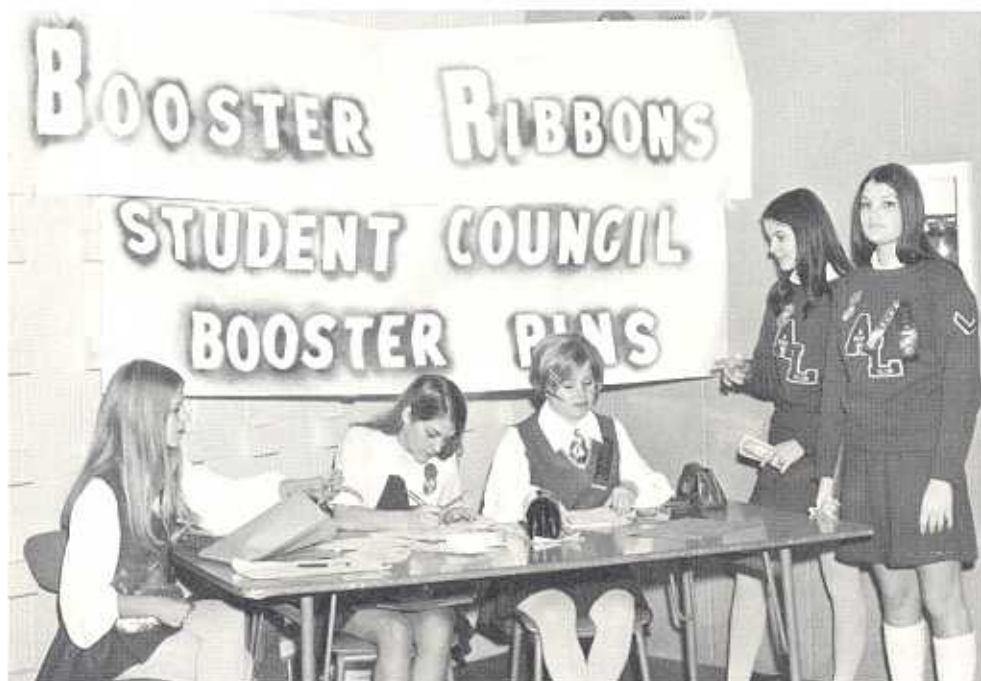

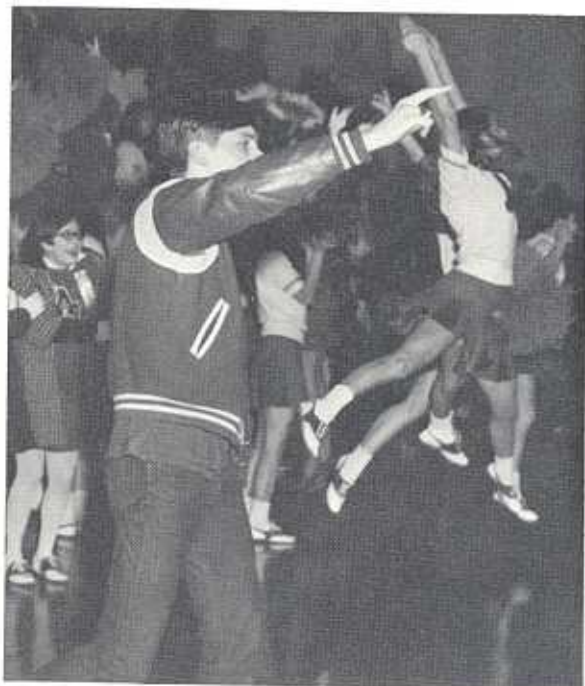
Cheerleaders sport new outfits

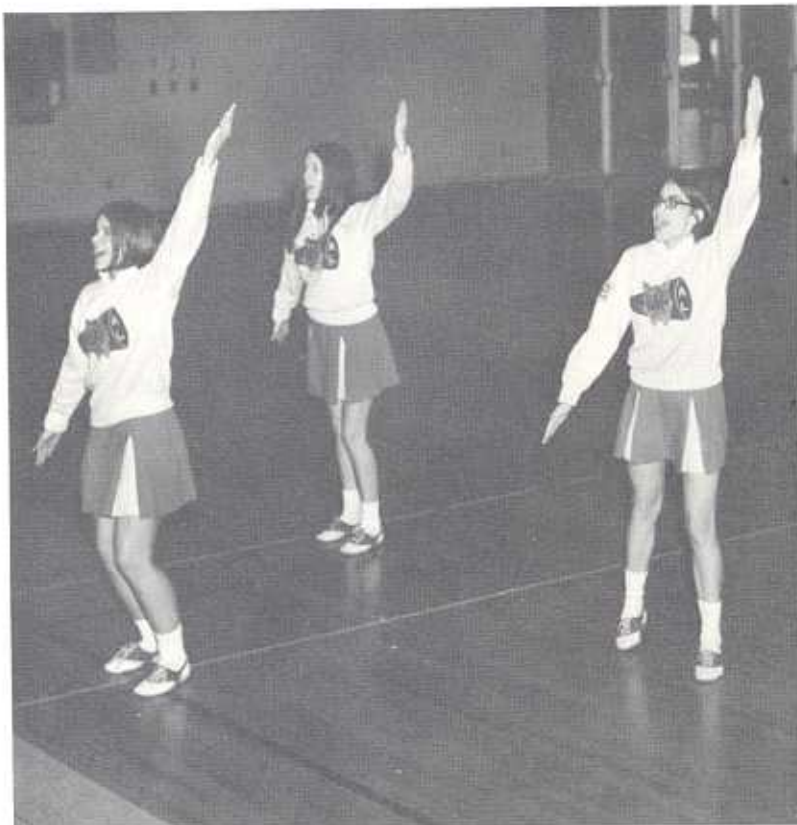

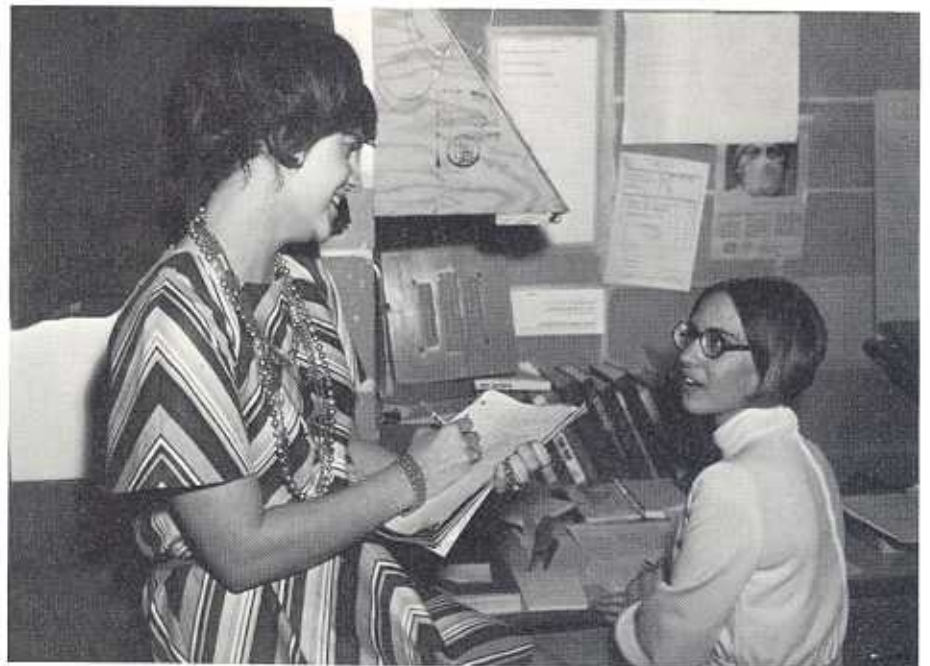

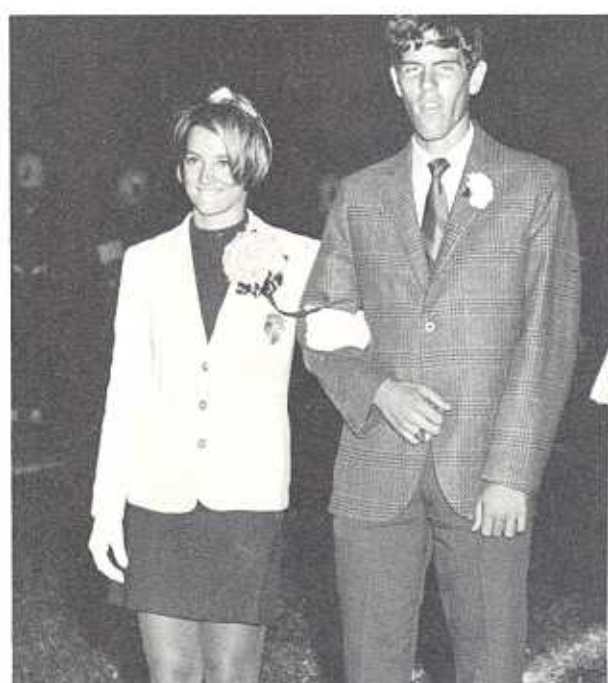

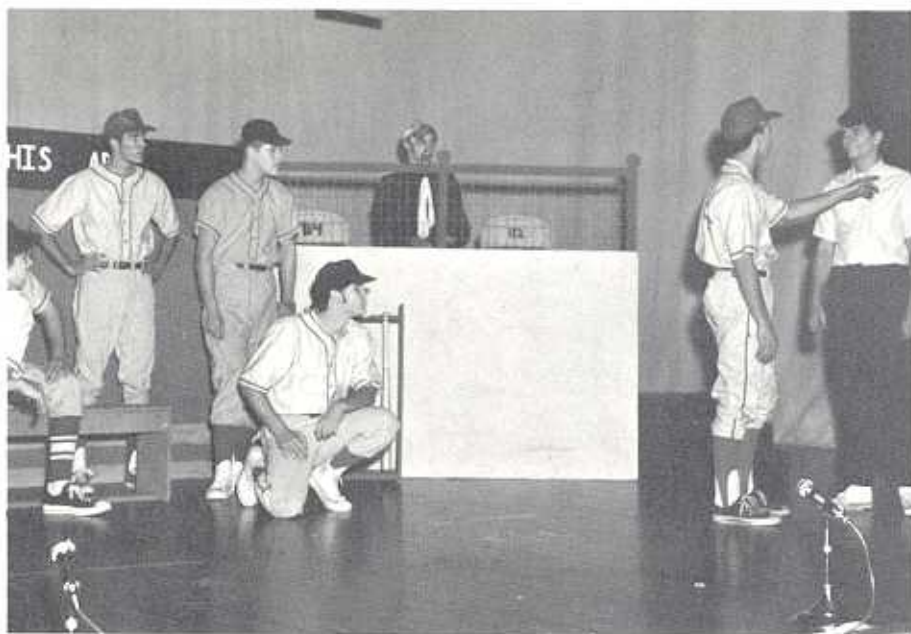

To the surprise of many, TWIRP Week was gone before it arrived!

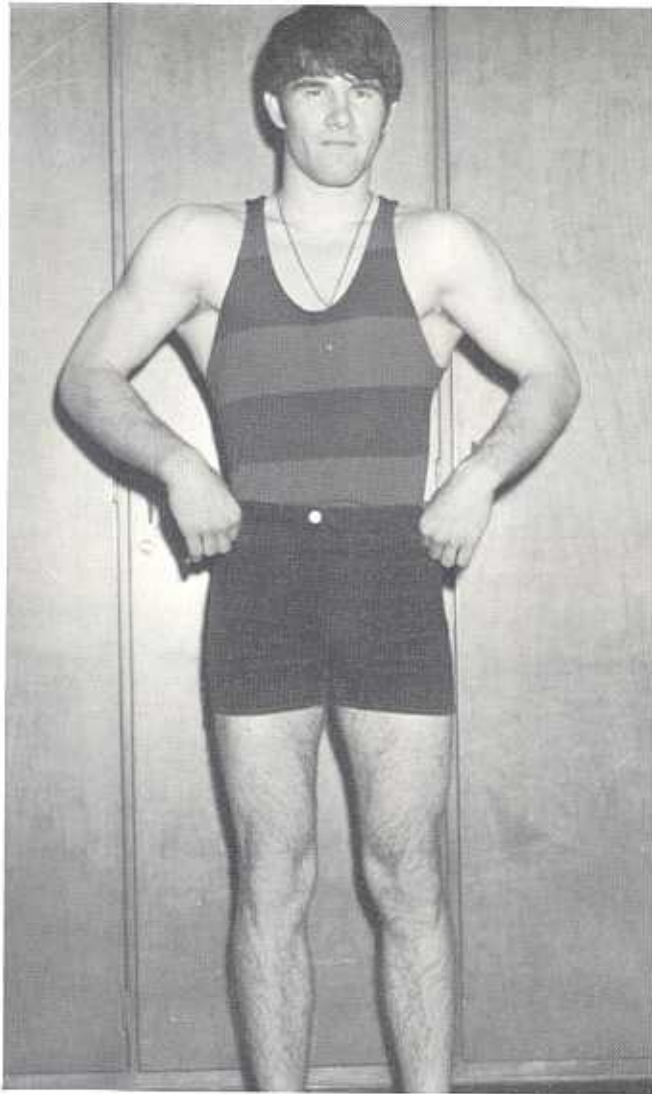

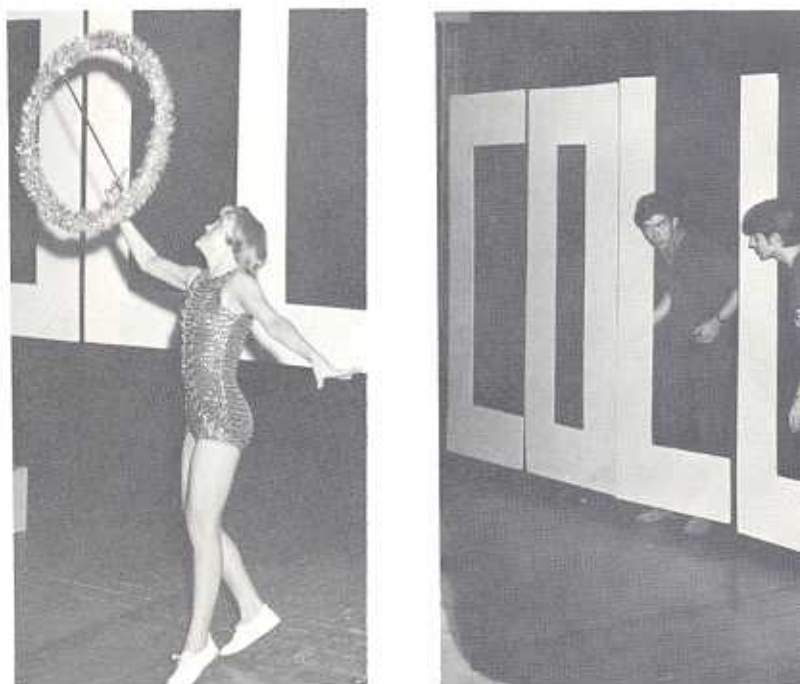

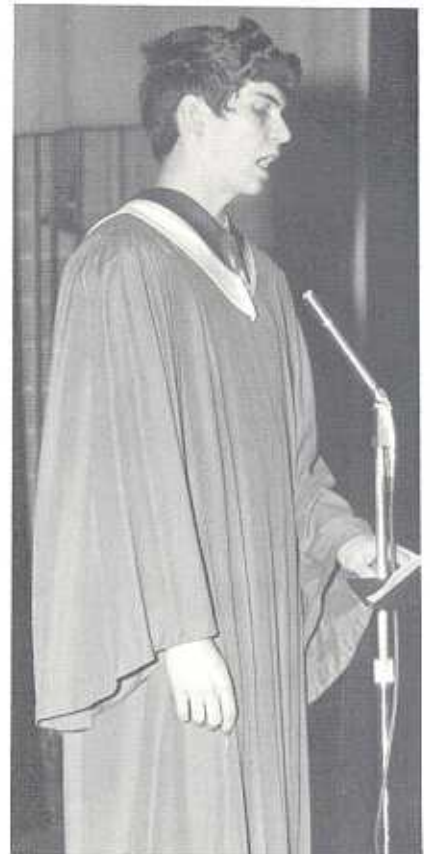

Entertainment was provided by the Dance Band and by Miss Erva Huckleberry who pinned on the corsages and boutonnières and received the kisses.



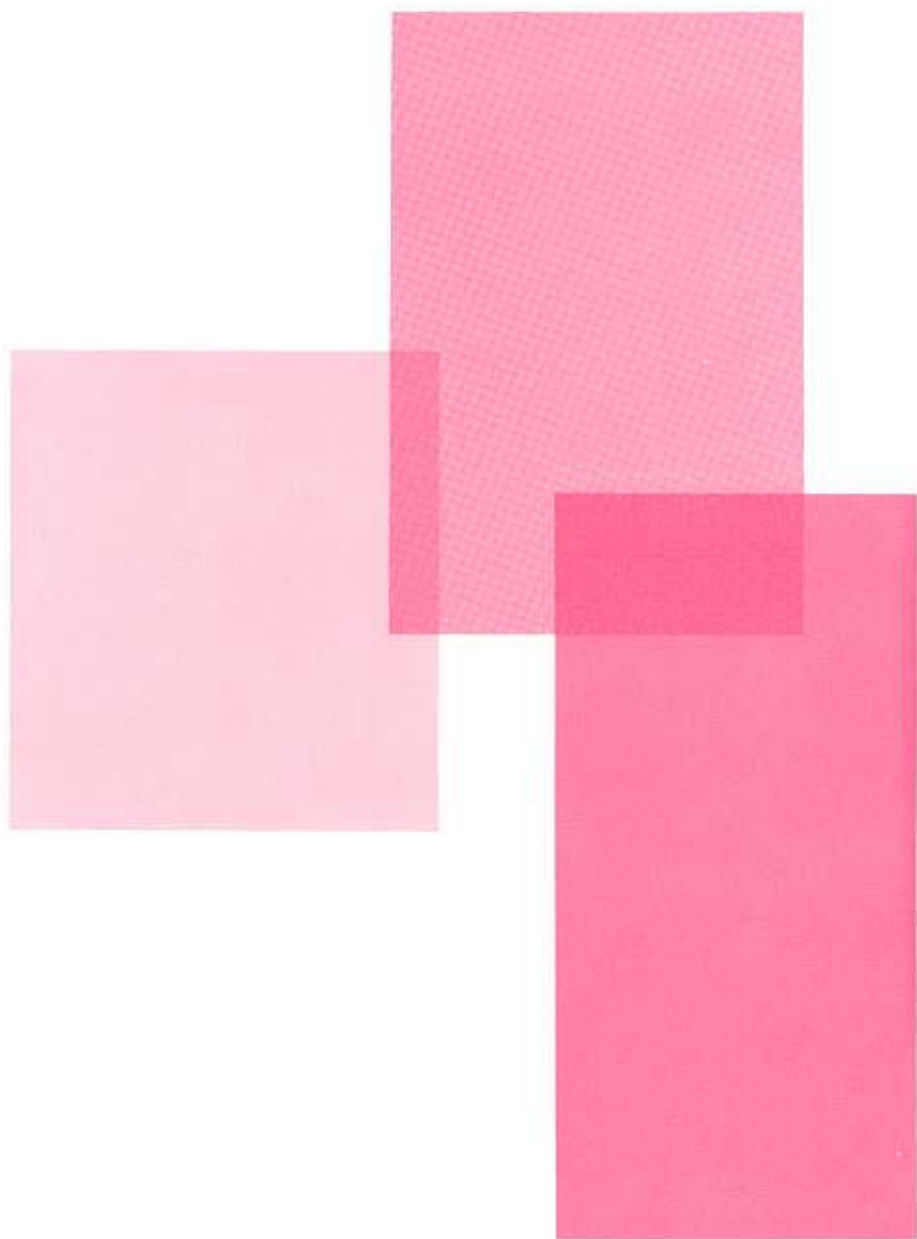

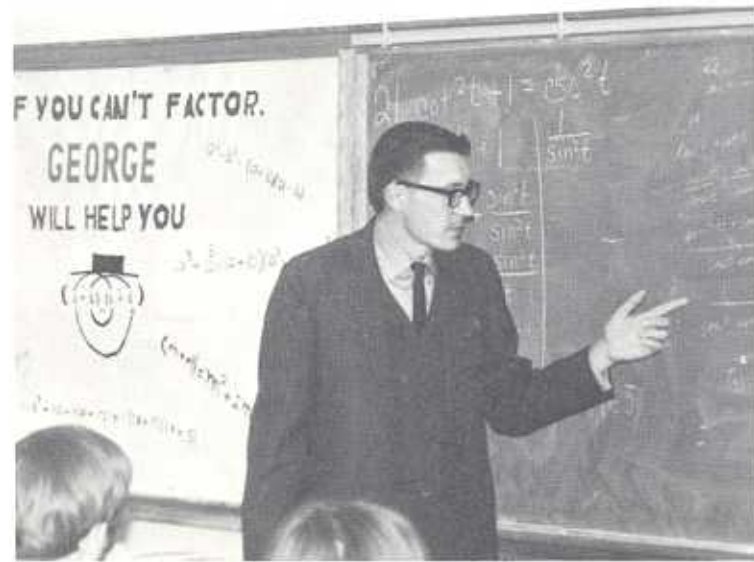

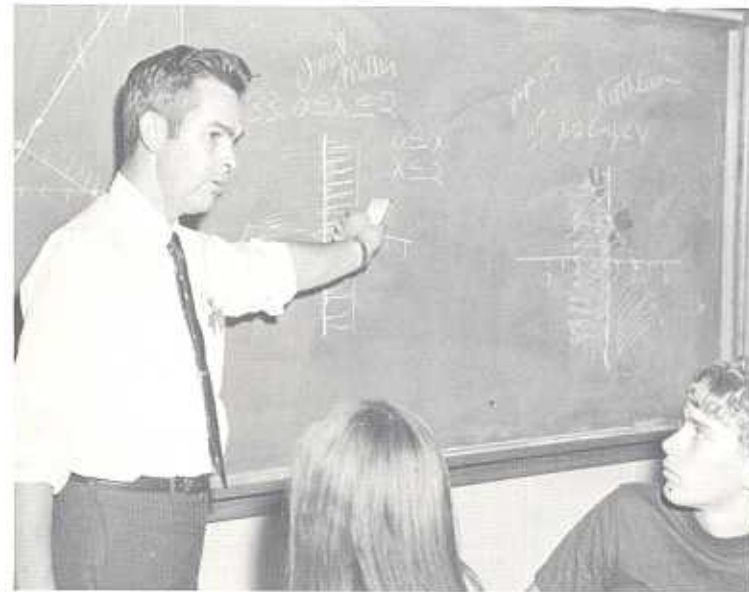

Models, slides, and "the real theory" were used to teach science.



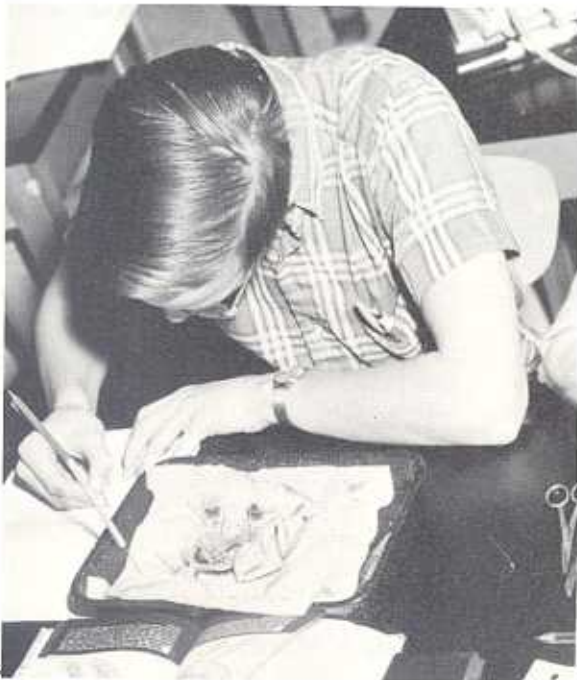

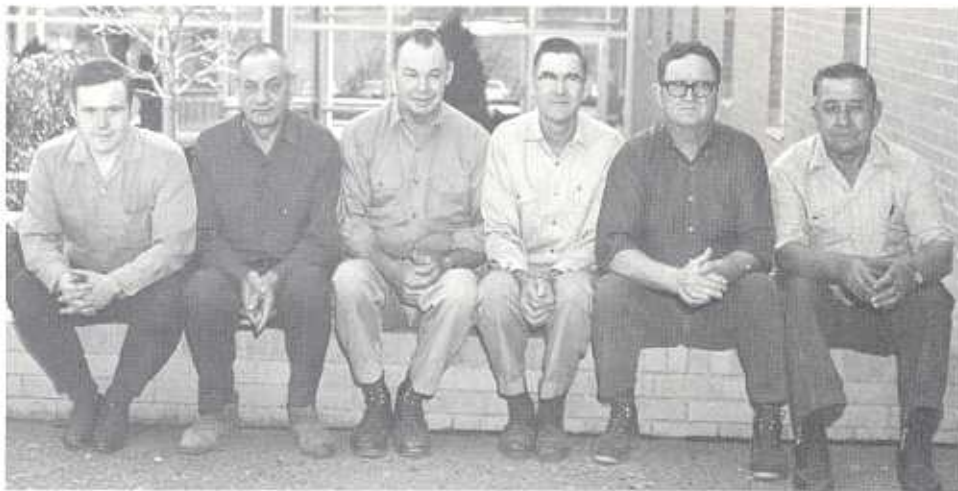

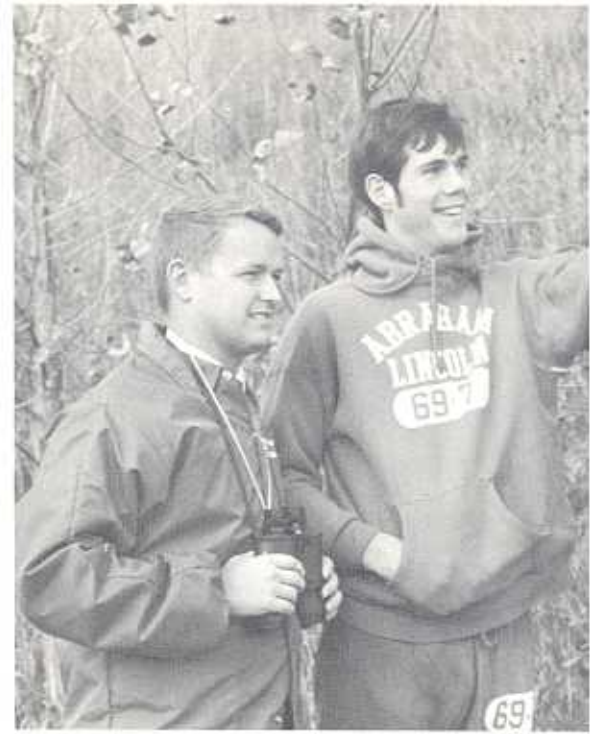

Backfield boosts A.L. offense

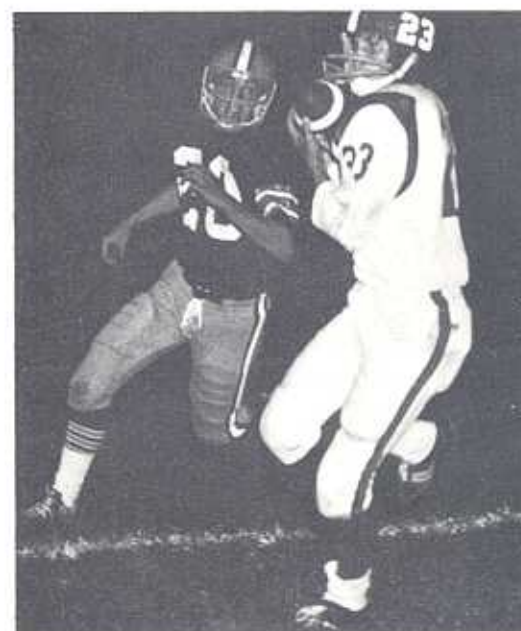

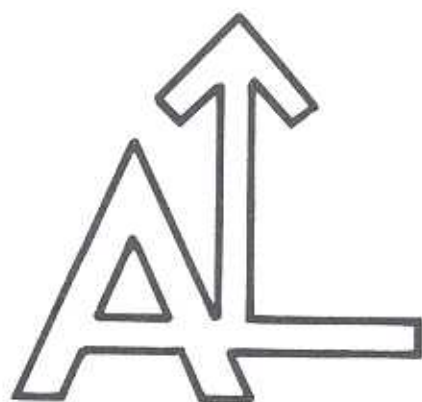

Bruce Talbott grinds out the yardage against two St. Albert's defenders.

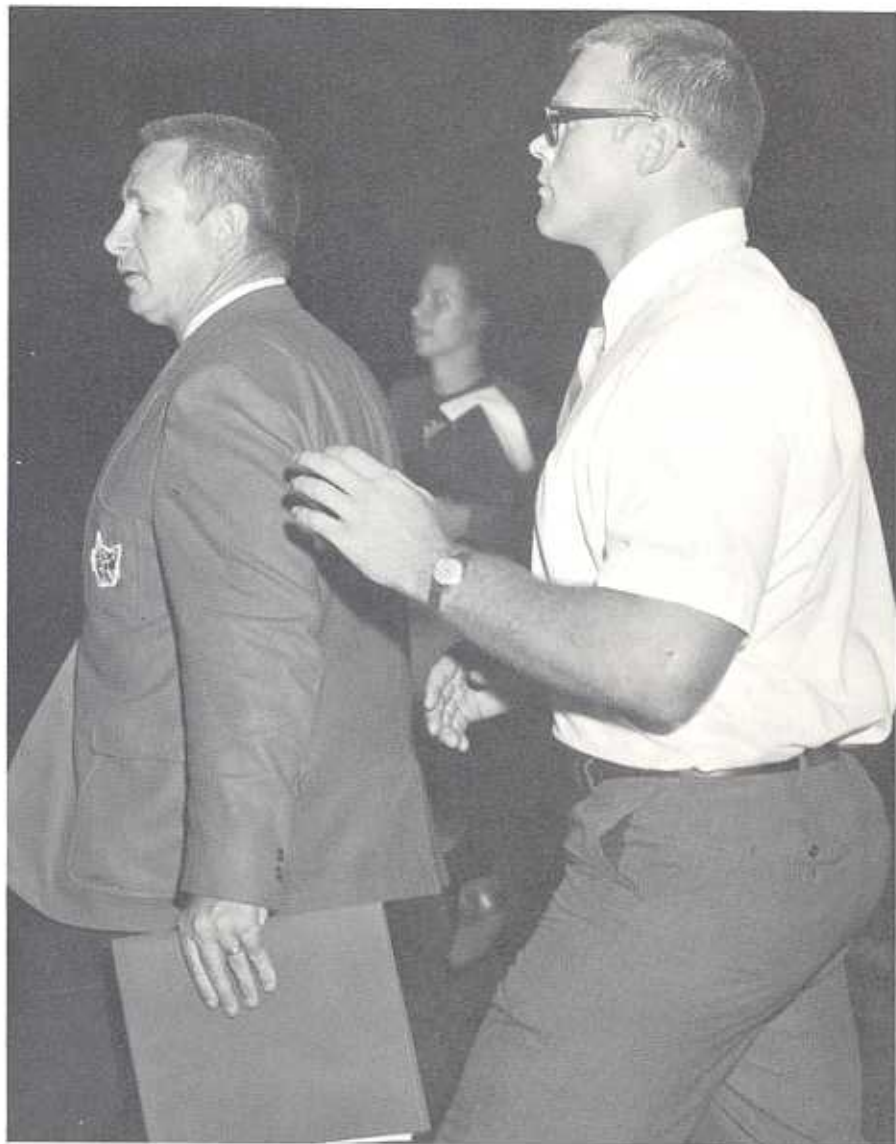


The crowd roars approval as Steve Bates charges downfield.

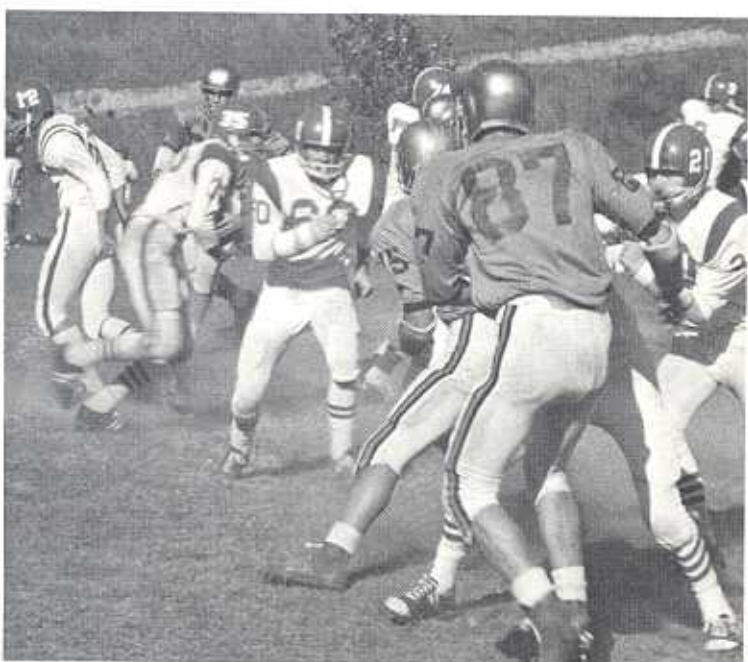

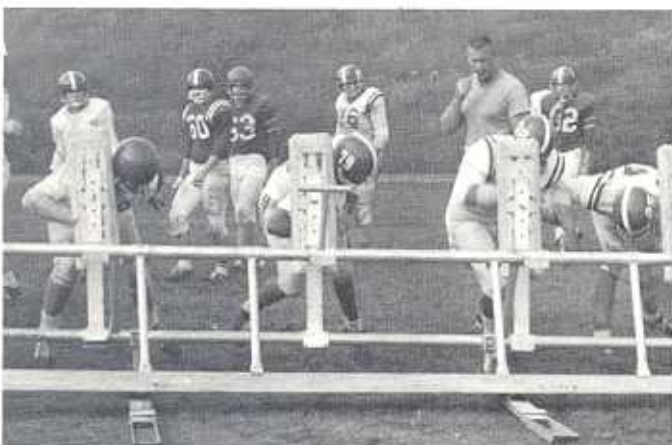

Gymnasts swing into things

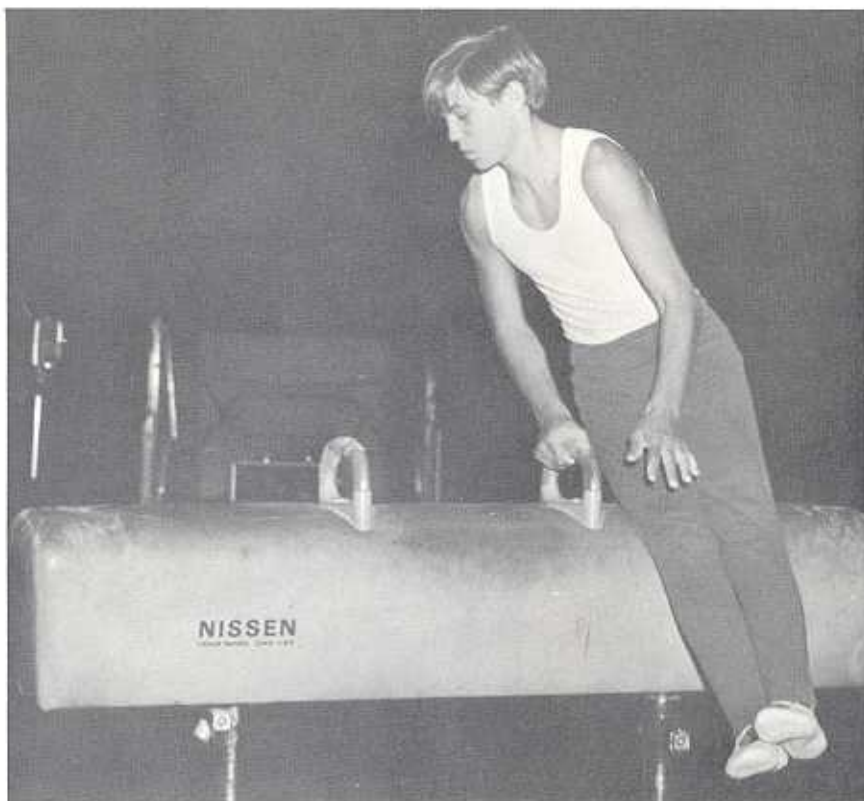

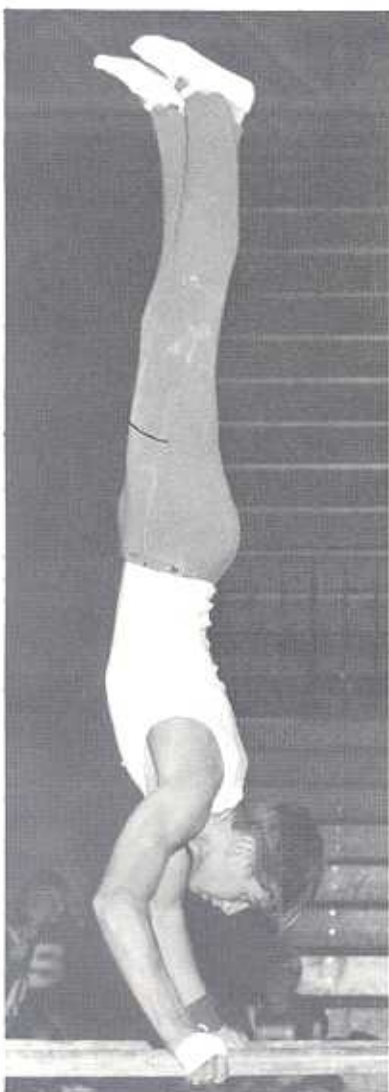

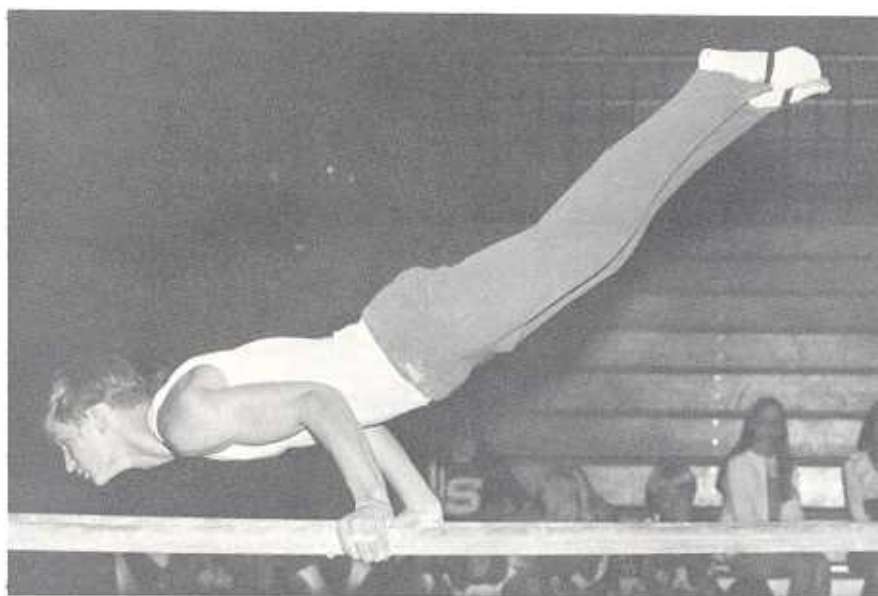

It was an exciting season except for one dry spell. Omnipotent sophomores proved themselves to be winners and should be a great asset in next year's varsity program.

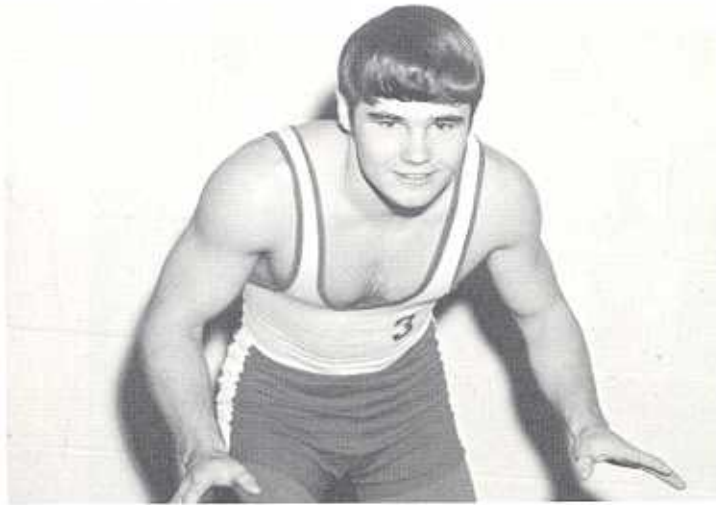

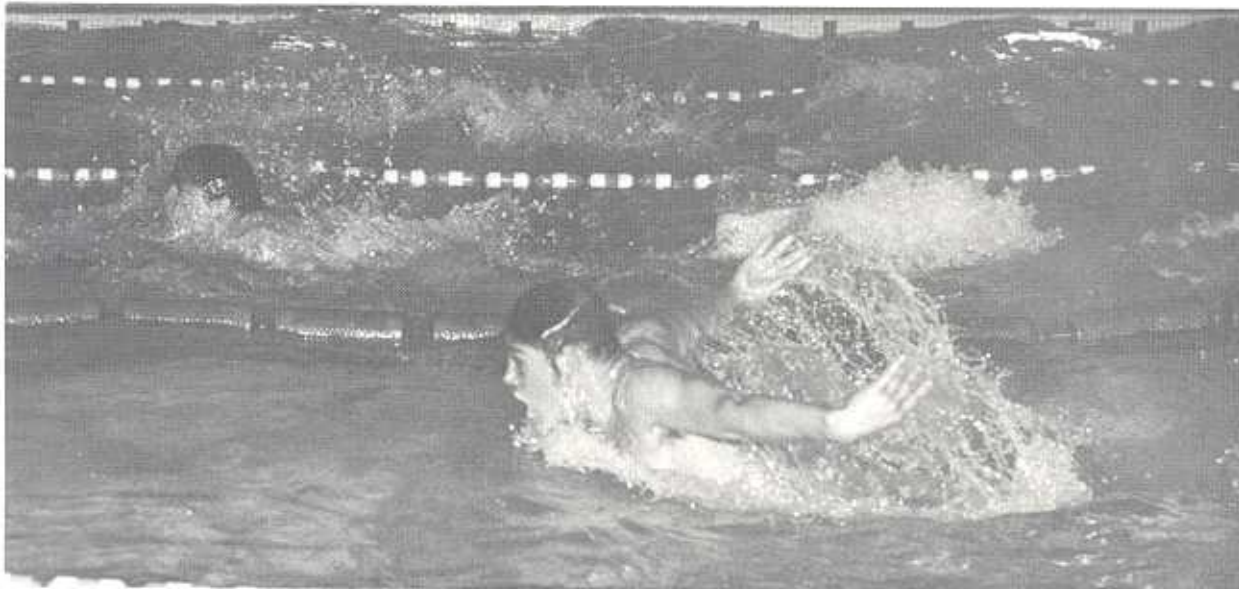

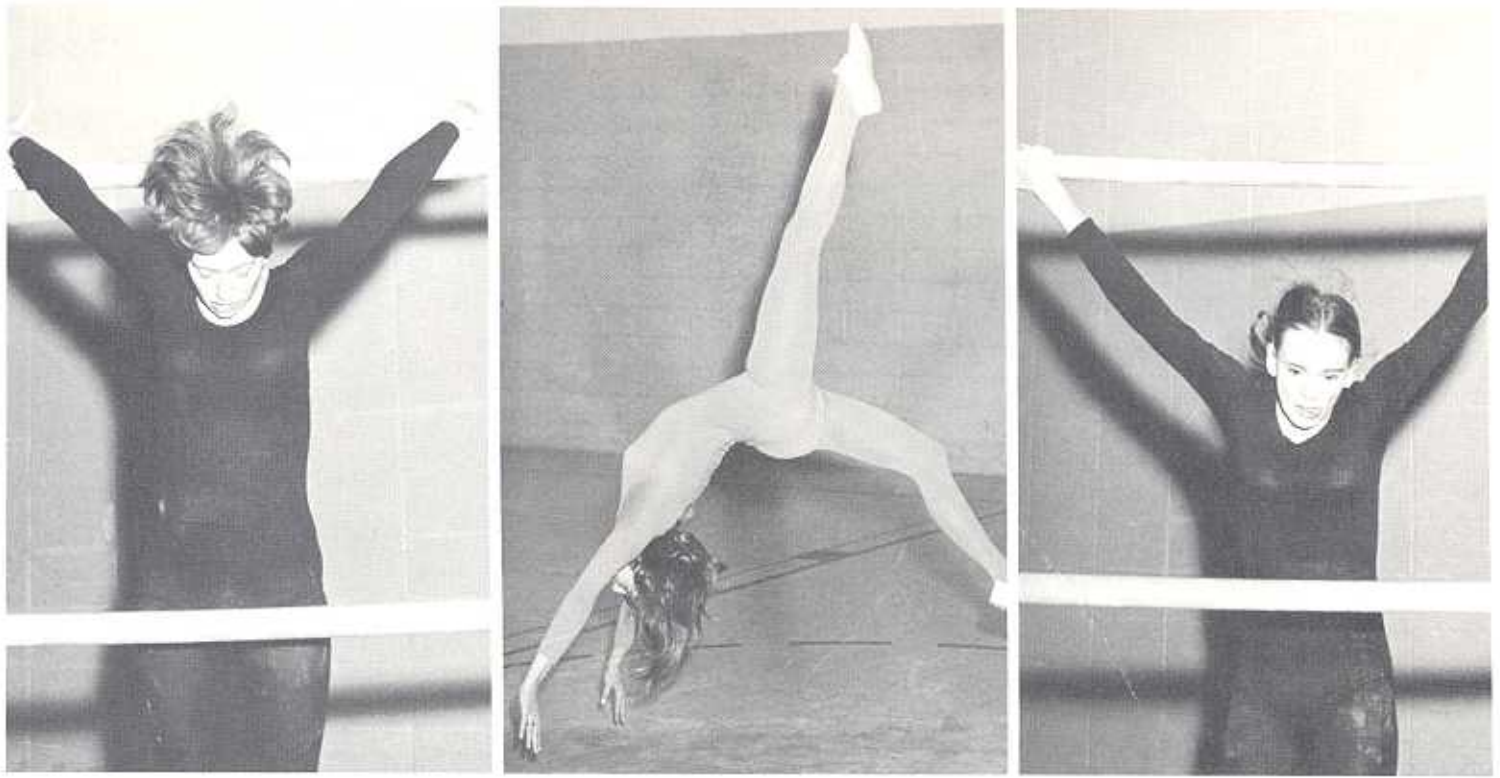

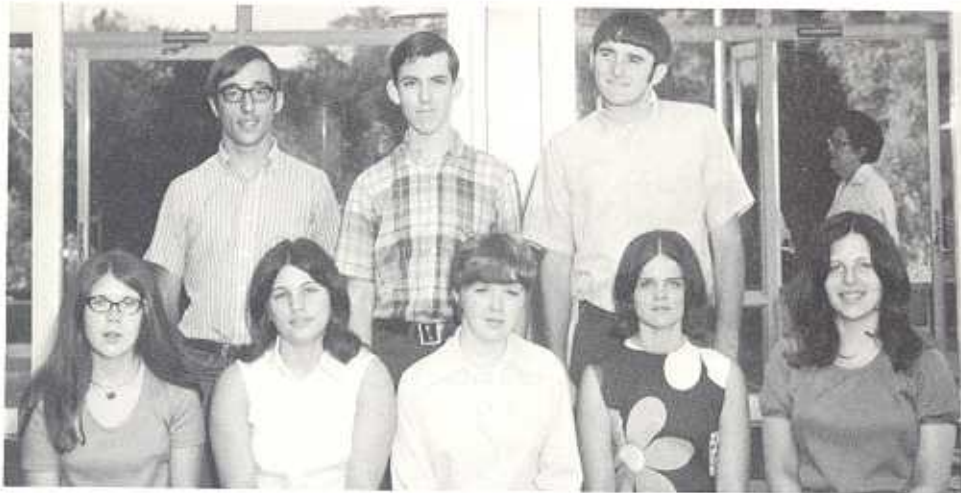

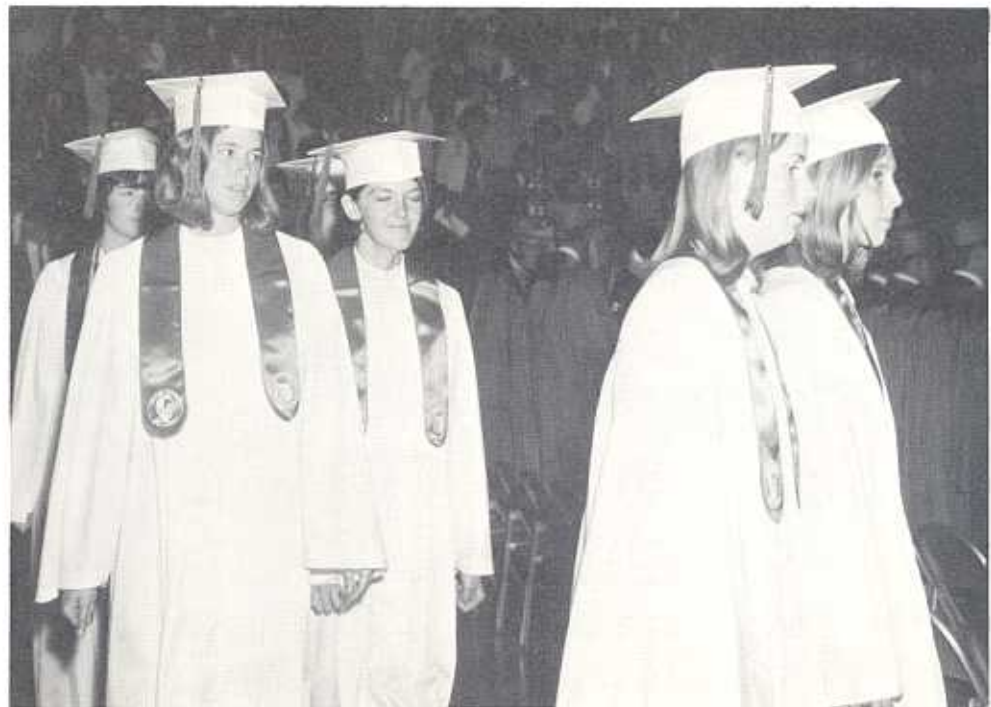

Staffers were a very busy bunch, but some were more dedicated than others. After missing a deadline, workers discovered that a yearbook doesn't finish itself.

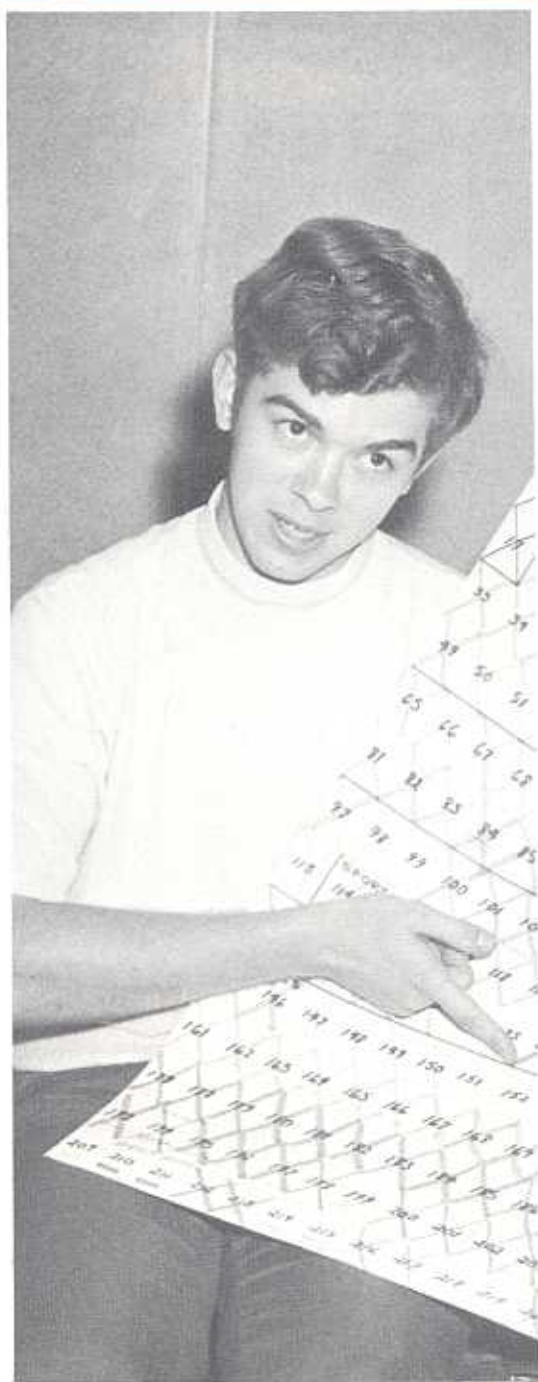
It was time to make book!
